North Salem High School

The Salem-Keizer School District has long been committed to music as a vital part of its students' education and has built a program that is nationally recognized for its quality. Over the past fourteen years, the number of students in the orchestra program has nearly tripled. There are now three string ensembles made up of dedicated young people who love music and can often be found at school an hour before the opening bell or at lunch time practicing their instruments. In 2016, a symphony component (The McKay Symphony Orchestra) was added to the orchestra program.





The North Salem High School orchestra program consists of students from 9th grade to 12th grade. The 68 students are divided into 3 ability grouped orchestra ensembles. The Chamber Orchestra is the top performing group, followed by the Advanced Symphony Strings and the Concert Orchestra. The Chamber Orchestra combines with select members of the Wind Ensemble to form a classical sized symphony orchestra. Both the symphony and string orchestra have made appearances at the OSAA state orchestra championships over the years.









North Medford High School

Newport Youth Symphony

The Medford S49c School District is the largest district in southern Oregon. Our string players have the opportunity to begin their instruments in 6th grade, meeting before or after school for 40 minutes, twice a week. Once in the 7th grade they are able to meet for orchestra daily. In high school we meet two out of every three days. Our numbers have grown dramatically in the last 10 years and we now have 3 orchestras at each middle school, and over-flowing numbers in our two levels at the high schools. NMHS Chamber orchestra has qualified for the state orchestra championships the last 5+ years in a row.





Students from the Oregon coast rehearse and perform together throughout the year in two new Newport Symphony Orchestrasponsored youth orchestras, co-coordinated and led by NSO violinists Kathy Follett and Barbara Wilcox, with help from other NSO string musicians and area instructors. The Newport Youth Symphony of the Oregon Coast (NYSOC) is a full orchestra that includes intermediate and advanced string students, as well as youth woodwind, brass, and percussion players. The 2016-2017 season runs September through May and includes young musicians in grade 4 to high school who rehearse together along with their adult accompanists.





Special Guests: The University of Oregon Orchestra

The University of Oregon Symphony Orchestra is the premiere orchestra at UO and one of the finest university orchestras on the west coast. It serves as a laboratory for music majors and especially talented non-majors who have demonstrated the necessary expertise to study ensemble performance technique and repertoire spanning a broad time frame and encompassing a wide variety of musical styles. The UOSO is committed to a robust musical experience for both students and audiences. Audiences enjoy thoughtful and exciting programming delivered by fresh musical talent, while students have the opportunity to collaborate with living composers, guest conductors, and soloists. Members of the UOSO do not merely "put on concerts," but are also encouraged to better understand and appreciate the music they perform, as well as the music-making process itself. The orchestra performs seven unique programs throughout the academic year, and also serves as the pit orchestra for the UO Opera Ensemble.



Adam Flatt

As Music Director of the Newport Symphony Orchestra, the Colorado Ballet, and the Tuscaloosa Symphony, Adam Flatt, conductor, is an artistic leader in three different regions of the United States. In addition, he is guest conductor for orchestras, ballet and opera companies all over the country.

Mr. Flatt also has a notable career in making music with some of our country's most talented young musicians. He serves on the summer faculties of both the Rocky Ridge Music Centre and the Curtis Institute of Music's Summerfest, and recently conducted the springtime residency of the Landes-Juqend-Sinfonie-Orchester Saar.

Mr. Flatt served an acclaimed seven year tenure as Music Director of the Denver Young Artists Orchestra, one of America's best youth orchestras, leading its concerts at home and on international tours. During his DYAO tenure Mr. Flatt founded the organization's first training ensembles: the Conservatory Orchestra and the Young String Ensemble. Before working in Denver, Mr. Flatt served for years on the staff of the Portland Youth Philharmonic, leading both of its training orchestras. He has led several festival and all-state orchestras in Indiana. California and Colorbraia

Adam Flatt has a masters degree in conducting from the Indiana University School of Music, and his bachelor's degree in music with honors from the University of California at Berkeley. He also studied at the Aspen Music Festival and the music academies of Vienna and Saarbrücken.



For over 20 years, Dan Allcott has been conducting daring collaborations, outstanding symphonic concerts, and leading opera and ballet productions with international stars.

Music Director of both the Oak Ridge Symphony and the Bryan Symphony orchestras in Tennessee, Allcott regularly conducts Tennessee's finest musicians (members of the Nashville, Knoxville, and Chattanooga Symphonies) in concerts lauded by critics and enthusiastically enjoyed by audiences. He has conducted the Dallas Symphony, Indianapolis Symphony, and Danish Radio Orchestra, and has a continuing relationship as a guest conductor with Asheville Lyric Opera. In 2013, Allcott became Artistic Advisor and Summer conductor with Eastport Strings in Maine.

Allcott served as Music Director and Principal Conductor for Atlanta Ballet from 2000-2010. In addition to traditional ballet scores, he led musical collaborations with the Indigo Girls, the New Birth Missionary Baptist Church Choir, the Red Clay Ramblers, the Michael O'Neal Singers, Atlanta Boy Choir, and the Atlanta Youth Choirs.

Allcott holds a masters degree in cello performance from Indiana University where he completed his coursework towards the Doctor of Music in both conducting and cello performance before he left graduate school to become Music Director of Altanta Baller At Indiana he served as Associate Instructor of Conducting and conductor of the Indiana University New Music Finemble.
